
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THE CITY

Copenhagen is an ancient city, full of beautiful historic buildings and many points of interest. The ramparts and walls surrounding the centre of the city were demolished around the middle of the nineteenth century. This allowed the city to assume the peculiar architectural structure characterised by narrow stone streets that lead directly to the city centre and which are the background to numerous shops and bars.

In recent years, Copenhagen's historic architectural heritage has been enriched with modern and contemporary buildings. An example of these are those designed by the Danish and French architects Bjarke Ingels and Jean Nouvel, who gave a new touch to the old-fashioned style of the city. At the same time, many districts have been modernised as well.

Copenhagen is also known for its relaxing atmosphere. Citizens go to work by bike, they like to go out with their families, spend an afternoon in one of the city's many parks in the company of their friends, take a bath in one of the many pools in the harbour during the warmer months and take an active part in the events that animate the city throughout the year.

Inner City



The Inner City can be defined as the metropolis of Copenhagen, which encompasses the oldest district of Copenhagen with pretty narrow

streets and original houses. The city centre is full of shops, bars, restaurants, parks, numerous canals and of course the Nyhavn, the wonderful harbour of Copenhagen. The main street of Inner City is Strøget, which goes from the town hall square to Kongens Nytorv. Strøget is always frequented by a myriad of street performers, but do not forget to take a trip to the pretty side streets like Frederiksberggade, Nygade and Vimmelskaftet.

Østerbro



Broad boulevards, impressive parks, countless cafes and innovating design shops. The neighborhood of Østerbro, which is also

called Copenhagen \emptyset , is somewhat posh and extravagant but at the same time completely down to earth.

Østerbro is located north of Copenhagen city centre, right nearby the old city gate Østerport. Shop design items at Normann Copenhagen, sip a glass of wine at Panzon or relax and rest in Fælledparken – Denmark's largest public park.

Frederiksberg



Frederiksberg is a fashionable part of Copenhagen with excellent shopping opportunities and green areas. It is considered to

be posher than Nørrebro and Vesterbro and people living here are usually slightly older and more established. The main street through Frederiksberg is Gammel Kongevej - 'Old Kings Road'. Shopping is great in this neighbourhood with a variety of clothing shops as well as sushi restaurants, cafes and delicacy shops. The same is true for Værnedamsvej, which is seen as cosy, yet cool. Frederiksberg is also a green oasis with Frederiksberg Gardens, the romantic garden of the Faculty of Life Sciences and Søndermarken.

district is situated within walking distance from the city centre, right behind the Central Station. It is one of the most fashionable places in the city - not just to live, but to shop, eat, drink and have an amazing and memorable night out.

Nørrebro



Vibrant, colourful, casual and young at heart, Nørrebro is a magic area of Copenhagen. Here you will find trendy bars and fashionable designer

shops next door to dodgy dive bars and cheap kebab places. If you are into small design shops head for Elmegade or Jægersborggade, and if you like antiques Ravnsborggade is the place for you to head to. At Sankt Hans Torv and the streets around it you have plenty of choices for dinner and drinks. And at Assistens Cemetery you can visit the grave of famous Danes, such as the famous fairy tale writer Hans Christian Andersen or philosopher Søren Kierkegaard, or get inspired by the Nørrebro citizens and relax in the park.

SUSTAINABLE CITY

Copenhagen is often mentioned as one of Europe's most environmentally conscious cities in Europe, if not the entire world. The Danish capital hopes to become carbon neutral by 2025, and it's already taken a number of steps toward this goal.

First, their buses are rapidly shifting from diesel



power to electric energy. Not only does it have a strong positive impact on air quality, but also reduces noise pollution. Additionally, more roads are being built specifically for biking. Subsidised prices for electric bikes are making the switch from cars ever more attractive.

When it comes to tourism, two-thirds of Copenhagen's hotels are eco-certified. This means they use the best standards for sustainable energy, food and design. Many of the city's restaurants sell organic food.

Green Bike Tours



Green Bike Tours is a non-profit company that offers bike tours and walking tours in English with a focus on the green and sustainable city.

Their routes take you through different parts of Copenhagen via bike-friendly streets and bridges. You'll bike at a comfortable pace trough the city center and into the neighborhoods of Vesterbro, Østerbro, Nørrebro and Islands Brygge.

On the 3-hour tour you will experience amazing hidden gems, urban gardens, wonderful green areas, cozy squares and recreative areas, plus solar installations, green roofs, harbour pools, green architecture, energy efficient buildings and wind turbines.

Urban Gardens and Wild Nature



Copenhagen has numerous parks and gardens that are perfect places to relax, sunbathe, have a picnic with friends or just read a book.

Copenhagen Municipality is driven by a nature-based urban development model, creating green spaces for humans as well as non-human animals. Instead of sterile green lawns you will see a jumble of wildflowers and herbs like Yarrow, Pulmonaria and Asters that are swarmed by eager insects.

The King's Garden is a popular spot for Copenhageners and Frederiksberg Gardens has lush open spaces and canals. Explore the district of St. Kjeld's neighbourhood on Østerbro where wild plants and freshly harvested vegetables are a common sight. Some of Copenhagen's cemeteries are commonly used as green breathing spaces perfect for a walk.

Copenhill



Copenhill is spectacular and innovative — an artificial ski slope and hiking area built on top of the new waste-to-energy plant. Copenhill supplies

energy to tens of thousands of homes and businesses. A guides tour will take you to the very top by elevator, where you will learn about the entire building: the architecture, the vision, sustainability practices and the ski slope.

You can bring your own skiing and snowboarding



equipment, or you can rent some from the local shop. The slope is open year round since it does not rely on snow. The shimmering metal structure has an excellent view of the Copenhagen's downtown.

If skiing is not your thing, how about climbing? The climbing wall at Copenhill is the world's tallest at 85 meters.

Explore beyond the settlement's infamous 'Pusher Street' – lined with shady hash and marijuana dealers who do not appreciate photographs – and you'll stumble upon a semi-bucolic wonderland of whimsical DIY homes, cosy garden plots, eateries, beer gardens, and music venues.

Rosenborg Slot



A 'once upon a time' combo of turrets, gables and moat, the early-17th-century Rosenborg Slot was built in Dutch Renaissance

style between 1606 and 1633 by King Christian IV to serve as his summer home. Today the castle's 24 upper rooms are chronologically arranged, housing the furnishings and portraits of each monarch from Christian IV to Frederik VII. The pièce de résistance is the basement Treasury, home to the dazzling crown jewels, among them Christian IV's glorious crown and Christian III's jewel-studded sword.

The Little Mermaid



New York has its Lady Liberty and Sydney its Danish-designed Opera House. When the world thinks of Copenhagen, the chances are they're

thinking of the Little Mermaid. Love her or loathe her (watch Copenhageners cringe at the very mention of her), this small, underwhelming statue is arguably the most photographed sight in the country, as well as the cause of countless 'Is that it?' shrugs from tourists who have trudged the kilometre or so along an often windswept harbourfront to see her.

Whether locals like it or not, The Little Mermaid



has become Copenhagen's most recognisable symbol, and visiting to snap a quick shot is, certainly, worth the detour from the city's core. This commemoration of Andersen's genius is conveniently located right next to the historic fortress of Kastellet, so make sure to walk through the green star-shaped area on your way back.



Not many stock exchanges are topped by a 56m-tall spire formed from the entwined tails of four dragons. Børsen is one. Constructed in the

Its still-functioning chamber of commerce is the oldest in Europe, though the building is not generally open to the public.

Denmark can be visited visa-free for up to 90 days by citizens of Australia, New Zealand, Japan, South Korea, Taiwan, Malaysia, Israel, UAE and

International (non-Schengen) travellers need a passport that is valid for at least 3 months after the end of their intended trip in order to enter the Schengen zone.
