Historically an important trading centre, Peshawar sits not far from the Khyber Pass, once part of the legendary Silk Route, and an important gateway to the Indian subcontinent travelled by prominent conquerors and explorers. Things remain volatile in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa border province, of which Peshawar is the capital, but recent trends seem to indicate a decline in criminality and a budding resurgence of urban life.



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THE CITY



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Some say Pakistan is one of the most fascinating places in the world, others (including governments worldwide, at the time of writing) caution against all but essential travel to the country, and its northern regions in particular. Regardless of which school of thought you adhere to, taking necessary precautions and remaining vigilant at all times is prerequisite, and staying up-to-speed with recent developments as they appear in the media is of high importance. Having a local guide to show you around is best, and in some cases an armed guard is assigned to foreign visitors to ensure extra security.

The areas of Peshawar of most interest to foreign visitors are the Old Town, University Town, and British Cantonment (with Saddar Road), the last two separated from each other by a railway constructed by the British post-1850. The central square of town is known as Chowk Yadgar, or "remembrance square", located inside the old walled city of Peshawar and sitting at the heart of Peshawar's many roads and bazaars.

Peshawar is also known as the birthplace of the Pakistani answer to Hollywood – Pollywood –, but remaining movie theatres where these films are screened are, unfortunately, few and far between, due to bombings carried out by Islamists deeming the films unruly.

DO & SEE

Given that most city exploration is done during daylight hours, there is plenty to easily fill a space of a few days. Apart from the must-dos of Peshawar Museum and the Old Town, one unusual attraction is the 1920s Khyber Railway, trips on which are only possible by prior appointment. Depending on their planned time of travel, adventure-seekers might want to look into visiting one of the notorious gun factories in the outlying Tribal Areas (or the infamous Darra Adam Khel), but doing so outside of a guided tour can be highly dangerous and is strongly advised against.

Peshawar Museum



Nowhere else in the world is there a collection of Gandharan art more extensive than that of the Peshawar Museum, housed inside an

attractive Victorian building (much of the Gandharan section was closed for renovations as of fall 2017, so do give a call prior to visiting).

Sethi Street



The Sethi Mohallah area within the walls of Peshawar's old town contains rare examples of Central Asian-inspired architecture, building

constructed by the once prosperous trader family. The intricate woodwork and carvings, along with ornamental interiors and stained glass windows and ceilings, make for a fascinating look around (mind that most houses are now privately owned).

Bala Hisar Fort



The imposing fort was once the seat of Afghan Durrani royals; ownership was transferred to the Sikhs in the 19th century, the fort eventually being

rebuilt by Britain to achieve the look it has today. Bala Hisar now houses the paramilitary forces of Pakistan (which makes a look inside problematic), but an on-site museum is open to the public.

Cunningham Clocktower



The Cunningham
Clocktower, known
locally as "Ghanta Ghar",
lies a mere couple of
hundred metres away
from the city's busy

centre, Chowk Yadgar. It was inaugurated in 1900, to commemorate the Diamond Jubilee of British queen Victoria. The Kalyan Bazar road that runs from here is lined with interesting examples of old merchant dwellings.

Khyber Pass



Security is of concern at present and trips to the Khyber Pass are best left for a better time (check official safety advice at your planned time of

travel), but do seize the opportunity when the opportunity comes. The pass has long been a gateway to South Asia (part of the ancient Silk Route), travelled by merchants, explorers and conquerors, the likes of Alexander the Great and Mughals, a channel that now connects Pakistan to the troubled Afghan territories via Torkham. Michni Checkpoint is as far as most visitors can count on getting.

DINING

Meat is an essential constituent of Peshawari dining, which comes in two main configurations: as tikka (barbecue) or karahi (a variety of spicy curry). A common way to order is to select the variety and amount of meat, and have it cooked in your presence. Other typical regional dishes include chapli kebab (and other sorts of grilled meats), fried fish, rice-based Kabuli palaw, and further Pashtun specialties. If you're sensitive to spice, make sure to indicate your desired levels of heat when placing an order.

Habibi



For a BBQ feast the region is know for, try the excellent Habibi, whose best offering is a special BBQ platter (the full version serves a party of

4 or 5, while the 1/2 is enough to feed a couple), which includes a variety of chicken, mutton, and fish dishes, as well as the Afghani rice-based speciality kabuli palaw.

Green tea (or kahwah) is the Peshawari beverage of choice. The age-old recipe dictates that tea be brewed in a large copper container (samovar), with spices like saffron, cinnamon and cardamom added for fragrance and flavor. Nowadays, liberties are often taken with the original recipe, but drinking kahwah remains an indispensable tradition. Another noteworthy treat is the falooda, a sweet dessert drink prepared with rose syrup, basil, jello bits and milk.

Cafe Crunch



Cafe Crunch is a pleasant surprise - unlike at many other city eateries, guests are welcome to linger for longer than the exact amount of time it takes to

NIGHTLIFE

There admittedly isn't much in the way of nightlife in Peshawar, and precaution must be taken if you do venture outside after dark (foreign visitors are often advised against it). The city's most common evening pastime is dining, with many restaurants staying open until late in the night (many also serve shisha). The sale and consumption of alcohol is forbidden in all of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa province, although underground booze-fuelled parties do take place, but information about those is, understandably, hard to come by, and admittance is by personal invitation only.

Pearl Continental Hotel



The Pearl Continental is one of the very few places in Peshawar that serve alcoholic drinks to non-Muslim foreigners, including beer produced

by Pakistan's longest standing Murree Brewery. The dining offer is extensive, and includes Italian and Chinese cuisines, as well as a rooftop barbecue restaurant. Live music and shows set the scene on occasion.

SHOPPING

Shopping is an art form in Peshawar, where avid bargain-hunters will feel right at home. Haggling is well-expected at markets (initial prices can be easily brought down by at least a third), and is even acceptable at some shops where prices appear to be fixed. Items to look out for include traditional chapli sandals, Afghani pakol (wool hats), pottery, brass and copper wares, quality fabrics, woven rugs, and more. Note that some areas, such as the Smugglers' Market, are best visited with a local guide.



Saddar Bazaar



A city's busiest shopping area across Pakistan and India is often known as "saddar", Peshawar being no exception. The array of shops and vendors is

simply staggering, and may prove overwhelming to the unprepared visitor, so do consider hiring a local guide. Haggling is acceptable at both markets and stores.

Safety



Multiple terrorist attacks have been carried out in Pakistan in recent years, including at places of interest attractive to tourists like markets,

cinemas, restaurants, and other places known to be frequented by foreigners. This applies to Peshawar especially, party due to the city's proximity to the Afghanistan border and lawless Tribal Areas, through which guns and drugs are known to flow freely.

At the time of writing (early 2018) all but essential travel to Peshawar is advised against. Threat of terrorist attacks and kidnappings is imminent, and solo exploration, particularly for female travellers, is not recommended, and strongly advised against after sundown. Modesty in dress is advised, which implies loose-fitting clothing that covers shoulders and legs.

Passport / Visa



Most travellers will need to apply for an entry visa via one of Pakistan's diplomatic missions. Visa on arrival may be issued in certain cases, but only

applies to a selected number of nationalities, and only for visitors travelling as part of an organised tour group or on business. Visa-free entry is granted to nationals of the Maldives, Nepal, Samoa, Tonga, Trinidad and Tobago.

Indian residents are subject to extra regulations and are not issued tourist visas, but may enter the country on a different type of visa. Citizens of India, along with Bangladesh, Bhutan, Israel, Nigeria, Palestine, Somalia and Uganda are required to register with the police upon arrival.
