

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THE REGION

Al Qassim region, also known as Al Gassim, gets its name from the word Qassimah — a reference to the region's sand dunes from which the white saxaul trees grow.

Located right in the very heart of the Arabian peninsula, Al-Qassim is very lush in comparison with the rest of the country, and as such it is the richest region and the agricultural centre of the Kingdom. It is often referred to as the "alimental basket" of Saudi Arabia. The region is home to more than eight million palm trees and is thus one of the world's largest producers of dates, as well as oranges, lemons and other fruit. Every autumn, thousands gather for the yearly date festival, where over 300,000 tons of dates are put on display and sold to eager and hungry visitors.

The region's capital and largest city is Buraidah, where approximately half of the province's 1.4 million inhabitants reside. It is the financial and cultural centre of the region, and holds most of the points of interest for tourists, including interesting museums, green parks and excellent markets. Unaizah is the second city in the region and also provides plenty of attractions and entertainment for visitors. The cities' surrounding rural areas are also worth visiting for a peek into the fascinating world of desert

agriculture.

DO & SEE



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The Al-Qassim region is quite unique in Saudi Arabia for green areas and agricultural prowess. The areas around Buraidah and Unaizah have some fascinating places to visit. Explore farms, orchards, palm tree plantations and the world's largest camel market. But the cities and towns themselves also offer travellers plenty of museums, parks and interesting sights, as well as heaps of entertainment in the form of excellent eating and shopping.

Al Qassim Camel Market



The city of Buraidah is home to the largest camel market in the world. Every morning at 6 am thousands of dromedaries, as well as

goats and sheep, are bought and sold here, along with saddles and other accessories. The Arabian one-hump camels are traditionally prized in Saudi Arabia as a source of protein (meat and milk), as well as leather. The best specimen are thoroughbred racing animal and are kept to keep up the country's culture camel racing.

The market is an integral part of Saudi Arabia,



and an excellent way to experience Arabian culture. You'll find many friendly smiles, baby camels, and a lively hectic atmosphere common for all animal markets.

Uyun Al-Jiwa



Uyun Al-Jiwa — literally "the valley's ponds" — is often referred to as the oasis celebrated by Arab poets for its significance in several poetry

collections known as the Suspended Odes (Mu'allaqat). The area is known for the ancient Banu Abs communities that lived here since prehistoric times. Depicting the lifestyle of ancient people, several Thamudic rock paintings can be found in the Al-Jiwa region — particularly in Al Hanadir, 15 km outside the city.

Be sure to visit the mud-and-adobe Al Margab Watchtower. Take a walk through the Old Uyun — a collection of houses built of clay and mud. Get souvenirs from the vibrant Old Souq and take a photo of the Antarah Rock. Also known as the Lovers' Rock, this precariously perched boulder is rumoured to be the place where the celebrated poet Antarah bin Shaddad met with his sweetheart Ablah.

Al Shinanah Tower



Despite being composed of mud and camel hair, Al Shinanah Tower has survived centuries and numerous battles. Reportedly, the 27-meter

(88-feet) tall tower was constructed in 1699, but the some historians estimate the building was erected anywhere between the 12th and 19th centuries. A low, narrow door at the base of the structure gives you access to the eight floors and three lookout windows.

The tower is located on the edge if Ar Rass town, whose name means "old well". Said well made human settlement possible in the area, and marked the town as one of the most important trade and pilgrimage stops.

Saudi Arabia eVisa



Saudi Arabia introduced a new eVisa system in October 2019, dramatically simplifying visa applications for citizens of multiple world

countries, including the USA, Canada, China, Japan, Australia, and much of Europe. The new multiple-entry visa will be processed within record time (as quickly as 30 minutes), issued for one year, and will allow visitors to stay in the country for up to 90 days during its validity period. This marks a watershed moment in the country's history, as Saudi Arabia has historically been off limits to non-Muslim tourists, with visas notoriously difficult to secure.

Citizens of countries not covered by the eVisa program will still need to turn to their nearest consulate to obtain a visa.

Al-Qassim Regional Airport



The Prince Naif bin Abdulaziz International Airport (ELQ), more commonly known as the Al-Qassim Regional Aiport or simply Gassim,

serves flights to various destinations around the Arab world, including the Emirates, Bahrain, Egypt and Qatar, and even reaches as far as Istanbul. It is located about 30 kilometres west of the city of Buraidah and about 40 kilometres from Unaizah, and the best way to get to either city from the airport is to take a taxi, but be sure to agree on a price beforehand.
