Teide National Park



Teide National Park, a World Heritage Site with over three million visitors a year, is the best place to see volcanic phenomena on Tenerife.

You'll be astounded by the colours and the wild force of this surreal landscape, overlooked by Spain's highest peak at 3,718 metres. It is home to many local species of fauna and flora, such as the Teide violet or Tenerife bugloss, whose bright colours stand in stark contrast to the thousands of tonnes of ochre running through this unique landscape.

Volcanic Experiences



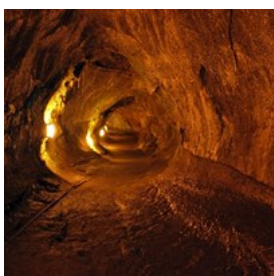
Lava flows through the very veins of the Island, a result of Tenerife's volcanic birth. To enable you to explore this aspect of the island, we've

Los Gigantes



The name Los Gigantes (The Giants) was given to this cliff for obvious reasons. This cliff in Santiago del Teide forms part of the Teno Rural

Park and at certain points towers 600 metres above sea level, with virtually sheer walls provoking a sense of vertigo even when seen from below.

Candelaria Basilica



Its white and beige tones provide stark contrast to the bronze statues of Los Menceyes (ancient pre-Spanish kings) standing alongside the basilica and the black volcanic sands of the beach at its feet. The religious value of this building is greatly enhanced by the treasure of incalculable spiritual value housed within: the exquisite statue of the Virgin of Candelaria, Patroness of the Canary Islands, highly revered by the islanders.

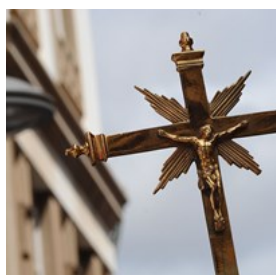
Local Festivals



From March to September, ox-drawn carts, traditional food, local wines and meats take centre stage in towns and villages all around the Island. Islanders wearing bright and colourful 'mago' costumes (traditional local dress) accompany 'parrandas' (traditional folk groups) playing Canary Island folk tunes and are the stars of the show at the festivals in Tegueste, San Benito (La Laguna) and San Roque (Garachico), three of the most popular festivities.

Easter Week, especially in La Laguna, or the Corpus Christi celebrations, most notably in La Orotava where you can enjoy tapestries made from flowers and sand from Mount Teide, are highly recommended. Carnivals

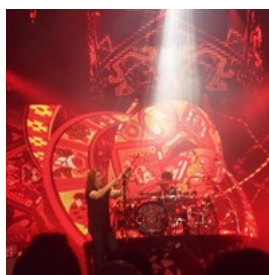

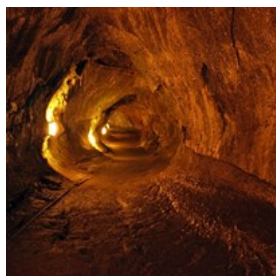
Canyoning

Dolphin and Whale Watching



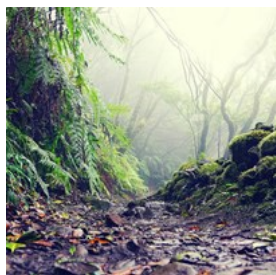
Tenerife is a top destination for whale and dolphin watching. 21 of the world's 79 species of dolphins and whales inhabit our waters,

including a permanent colony of some 500 pilot whales and 250 bottlenose dolphins. They are most commonly found in the waters between the south coast of Tenerife and the island of La Gomera. They are also very close to shore, about three miles, allowing them to be seen all year round.

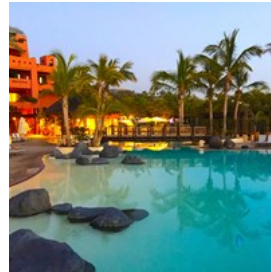

Archaeologists dispute why and when they were created, with theories concerning Aborigines and local farmers. Some believe these structures suggest contact between the Tenerife natives and the Aztecs.

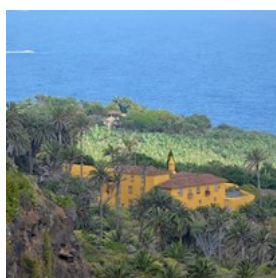

La Rambla de Castro Coastal Path



For a relaxing stroll, follow this 2km coastal path through a nature preserve. Starting at sea level at the beach of Los Roques, this path takes in wonderful ocean views, craggy cliffs, and palm groves. Historic landmarks on the route include the Casona de Castro (Manor house), Saint Peter's hermitage, and the 18th century San Bernardo's Fort. The walk is not strenuous and public transport is available at the end of the route.

BEACHES



Turismo de Canarias

On the island there are around 70 kilometres of beaches where you can enjoy a variety of activities, including pedalos, jet skis and parasailing. Or you can just relax, let the sea breeze cool you down and have a quick dip whenever you fancy. Most beaches on Tenerife have been awarded the Blue Flag for the quality of the water, the services available and their easy access. Beaches with golden sand are mainly to be found in the south, from Güímar to Adeje. Las Vistas, Las Galletas, El Médano, Torviscas and Fañabé are some good examples. For more information, visit:

Las Teresitas

Around the metropolitan area, the most famous beach is called Las Teresitas, in Santa Cruz, the Island's capital. At 1.5 kilometres in length, its golden sands and close proximity to the small coastal town of San Andrés make it ideal for a relaxing day sat under a tropical palm tree (while in the area, you can also visit the nearby Anaga Rural Park and its lush green forests dotted with white houses).

Black Sand Beaches

Due to its volcanic origins, Tenerife also has beaches of black sand, mainly in the north of the Island. On such beaches, your skin soaks up their famous mineral salts which reduce stress and increase blood circulation, among other benefits. The most popular beaches include Playa Jardín, in Puerto de la Cruz, El Socorro, in Los Realejos, and San Marcos, in Icod de los Vinos.

Volcanic Pools

A great way to enjoy the sea on the Island is to visit the natural pools formed long ago by lava as it flowed into the ocean. The most popular are at Bajamar, Punta del Hidalgo (La Laguna), San Juan de la Rambla (Charco La Laja), Garachico (El Caletón) and San Miguel.

Tenerife is for you if your idea of relaxation is to ride into the horizon on a road or mountain bike, take to the windswept shores on a windsurfing board, put your trainers on and run across mountains. Thanks to its excellent conditions, the island is appreciated by professional athletes who come to train and prepare for elite competitions. national swim teams, and more, are some of the athletes who train in Tenerife.

Hiking



There are over 1,000 kilometres of trails to choose from on Tenerife, each taking you through volcanic formations, pine forests, rugged cliffs and other natural wonders. To go up to the Teide Summit, you have to request a special permit. Also be sure to have all the necessary equipment, protection from sun and rain, as well as plenty of food and water.

Scuba Diving



Tenerife's waters are rife with wildlife and natural beauty, and there is no better way to admire it all than by scuba diving. There are over 60 dive sites available to you, spread out all along the coast. You can dive at any time of year with visibility from 10 to 30 metres. Although diving conditions may vary, the water temperature is constant and always somewhere between 19 °C and 26 °C.

Mountain Biking



There are over 200 kilometres of forest tracks available to you. Most of them run through the high part of the island, above all in the

Corona Forestal. The network of tracks connects a large part of the North with the area of Tacoronte and the South, allowing you to start and finish in places with services and, in many cases, with public transport and car parks. The network of tracks allows you to tailor the routes according to difficulty, kilometers and the type of scenery you want to see.

Surfing and Bodyboarding

Stand-Up Paddle Surfing



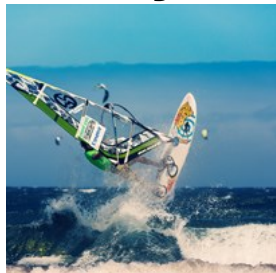
Get onto your board, pick up your oar and let the journey begin. You'll discover spots that very few ever get to. You'll exercise all of your

You can do windsurfing all year round. Winds are usually easterly and north-easterly. Depending on how strong the wind is, there are two seasons

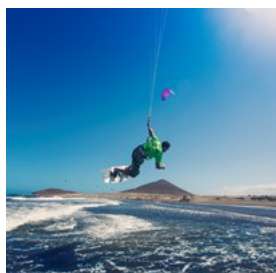

You can go kitesurfing all year: the El Médano area has an average of 300 days of wind a year and the water temperature oscillates between 19 °C

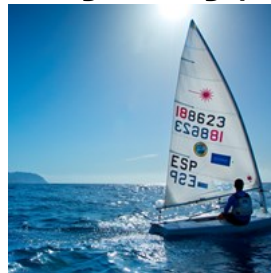

Sailing and Dinghy Sailing



Imagine a winter with sun and a 22-knot wind.

There are fewer better conditions for sailing. It can be done all over the island, although the easterly and south-easterly coasts are the windiest. 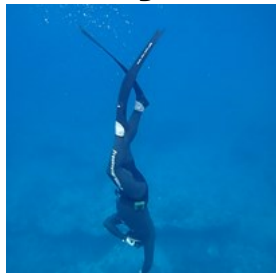

Free Diving

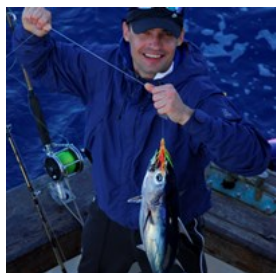


Tenerife is one of the main destinations in Europe for free diving. It can be attempted all year round, as the water temperature is constant
